Raja Ram Mohan Roy, known as the 'Bengal Renaissance', opposed the practice of Sati.

Lord Will Bayam, in 1829, passed the Bengal Sati Regulation. Through this act, the practice of Sati was abolished throughout India.

In 1987, the Sati (Prevention) Act was passed. Through this act, Sati was changed to a crime and this was punishable by death.
